We have 134 patients currently with 268 attendances coded for Prep. (PREPA)

Yes. Due to redeployment/staff illness we were unable to roll out our Nurse PrEP training in 2021 so patients were having to be booked as extra patients on Dr lists. We have now implemented a training package for our Band 6 and 7 Nurses allowing more Clinicians to be able to offer first/repeat PrEP. All Nurses have had training on eligibility for PrEP so can signpost patients to Clinicians who are more aware in order to administer PrEP so patients are not having delays in care.

We are unable to provide precise figures when those figures refer to individuals in volumes of 5 or less due to the risk that individuals will be reidentified, as we are required to protect their identity under the General Data Protection Regulations & Data Protection Act 2018. In such circumstances, sections 40(2) and (3) of the Freedom of Information Act apply. In this case, our view is that disclosure would breach the first data protection principle. This states that personal data should be processed "lawfully, fairly and in a transparent manner". It is the lawful aspect

of this principle which, in our view, would be breached by disclosure. In such circumstances section 40 confers an absolute exemption on disclosure.

2.12.3. Are there any barriers or reasons why this work is not able to take place? (Please specify)

Our current level of workforce doesn't allow for this. This applies to both Doctors, Nurses and our Healthcare assistants. We do have a health improvement team who provide Sexual Health outreach for young people, injecting drug users and offer STI screening for asylum seekers. If someone was deemed eligible for PrEP then the team would try and facilitate getting them to clinic for PrEP.

2.13. Are there any PrEP service changes planned or envisaged in the next 6 months? (Please specify)

Yes. Once all Nurses are trained, patients will be able to call reception and have a telephone PrEP review before coming for a short appointment for screening and collection of meds. Future digital developments will also help to enhance the service.

2.14. Do you have the resources or tools you need to ensure everyone who is eligible for PrEP or might benefit from it is identified and able to access PrEP?

Yes. As our Directorate comes under Community Care, we will be training local GPs to ensure that they are up to date with PrEP eligibility. We have also added our PrEP clinic to choose and book for our local area so if a GP sees a patient who they think might be eligible, they can directly refer the patient to our service.
