Subject: Oncology treatment for inpatients

REQUEST & RESPONSE

I would like a statement on your Trust's policy - or the details of the policy - regarding oncology treatment for inpatients in your Trust's hospital.

To clarify,

i. If a patient residing in one of the Trust's hospitals was diagnosed or had previously been diagnosed with cancer, would they be able to receive treatment when they were an inpatient.

A difficult question to answer because of the many variables and factors to consider which would be on an individual level. However, in theory if a patient had haematological malignancy and required treatment, was medically suitable for treatment, and it was a regime that was able to be given at the trust, and not a tertiary centre then this could happen.

ii. If not, does the Trust have a policy of patients receiving treatment for cancer only when they are an outpatient - and does this depend on which kind of treatment they receive?

Again, this is entirely individual. The stage of disease, type of malignancy, site, and the required intensity of treatment required are all factors in determining a decision.

iii. In addition, could you please confirm the average time it takes from the decision that a patient is medically fit to be discharged until they are discharged.

Unable to answer, discharge is a multifactorial, multidisciplinary decision and not singularly due to cancer or disease stage. It could involve multiple co-morbidities.
