Meet Rob Cooper, MWL's new Chief Executive



Rob Cooper started his new role as Chief Executive for Mersey and West Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust on 1st December 2024. Rob has worked at the Trust since 2015 and has more than 25 years' experience in health and social care.

After obtaining a nursing degree at Liverpool University, Rob joined the NHS and worked across a range of specialties including urgent and emergency care, vascular surgery and intensive care at both Arrowe Park Hospital and Salford Royal, before taking his first steps into leadership as a senior nurse manager.

From there, he gained extensive experience in several senior positions including as Head of Urgent Care at Wirral University Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust before joining the former St Helens and Knowsley Teaching Hospitals Trust (STHK) in 2015 as Assistant Director of Operations. One year later, he progressed to become Director of Operations and Performance and during this period, Rob played a key role in the Trust securing its "Outstanding" CQC rating.

In 2022, Rob became Managing Director, leading on organisational change as STHK partnered with Southport and Ormskirk hospitals to become Mersey and West Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust (MWL).

Rob said, "This is a very proud moment for me. MWL is a fantastic organisation, with a longstanding history of outstanding care and a trusted reputation in our local communities. I am truly honoured to be Chief Executive here.

"I've been part of MWL for nine years now, and over that time I have had the absolute pleasure of working alongside so many amazingly talented staff.

"Every part of the NHS is under significant pressure at the moment and the areas of Merseyside and West Lancashire are no exception. My focus will be on making sure that we continue to look after our patients and our staff to the highest standards against this challenging backdrop.

"I'd also like to thank my predecessor, Ann Marr OBE, for her tireless commitment to our patients and staff over her 22 years at the Trust. Ann transformed Whiston and St Helens hospitals into the world-class facilities they are today, leading the former St Helens and Knowsley Trust to receive its outstanding CQC rating."

We hope you will join us in wishing Rob every success in his new exciting role and look forward to the future of MWL under his care.

Patient Story



A patient at Whiston Hospital provided feedback after receiving support to stop smoking from the smoke-free service whilst in the hospital. Her story highlights how intervention from the stop smoking team can provide a unique moment for patients whilst in the hospital and help them to stop smoking regardless of the amount of time they have been a smoker. The patient had been a smoker for 64 years and explained trying to stop many times unsuccessfully. She expressed her gratitude for the time taken to explain exactly what is inside a cigarette and the difference this made to her success. She has remained a nonsmoker since her discharge.



The patient worked with the Smoke-Free Team and Patient Experience & Inclusion Team to create a video detailing her experience that will hopefully inspire others and highlight the importance of screening patients on admission to the hospital. The video was shared with the Executive Team, Patient Experience Council and a smoke free networking event between the Trust and community services.

Baby Loss Awareness Week

Baby Loss Awareness Week took place between 9th - 15th October and MWL marked the occasion across the Trust. Two special services took place as part of the week, which gave anyone touched by pregnancy and baby loss a safe and supportive space to share their experiences and feel that they are not alone.

A Wave of Light and Candle Lighting Ceremony was held at Ormskirk Hospital on Wednesday 9th October in the Evergreen Garden, and Whiston Hospital hosted a Baby Loss Remembrance Service on Saturday 12th October. The hospitals also lit up pink and blue to mark the awareness week.

National accreditation for the Cardiac Rehabilitation Team





In October, the Trust Cardiac Rehabilitation Team achieved a national accreditation for the outstanding service it delivers to patients. The team, based at Fingerpost

Health Centre in St Helens, provides a vital service in the community to get people back on their feet when they leave hospital after a heart attack, heart surgery or coronary intervention procedure.

The service has now received accreditation from the National Association of Cardiac Rehabilitation's (NACR) for its fantastic work. The accreditation reflects the fact that our service meets and maintains all the national standards and can show this by the data we submit each month. Amanda Leyland, Cardiac Services Manager, said "I'm proud of the hard work and dedication of an outstanding team and service".

Wear Red Day 2024

The Show Racism the Red Card campaign celebrated its 10th anniversary on 18th October 2024. The Patient Experience and Inclusion Team and Workforce Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Team visited areas across the Trust to talk all things anti-racism and Black History Month. Staff also wore the colour red to show their support for such an important cause.





MWL opens its first Changing Places facility

To mark International Day for Disabled Persons, the Trust launched its first Changing Places facility in Nightingale House at Whiston Hospital.



Changing Places facilities provide suitable toilets for people who need enhanced facilities to support their needs. This may include people with conditions such as an acquired brain injury, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, spina bifida or motor neurone disease, while also providing support for carers.

A Changing Places facility provides a number of unique features compared to a standard accessible toilet, including a height adjustable adult-sized changing bench, a ceiling track hoist system, a centrally located toilet and shower facilities.

The Changing Places facility is open to all employees and visitors. It is available from 8:30am-4:30pm Monday to Friday and can be accessed by anyone with a RADAR key. National accreditation awarded to the Anaesthetics Department

The Anaesthetics Department at Southport and Ormskirk hospitals has been awarded the prestigious Anaesthesia Clinical Services Accreditation (ACSA) in recognition of the outstanding service it provides to patients.



ACSA is a unique scheme for anaesthetic departments in the NHS that enables them to measure their performance against defined standards and clinical guidelines; while getting the assurance they provide high quality patient care from an external peer review visit.

Sue Curran, Directorate Manager for Theatres, said: "I could not be more delighted with the team's achievement, it is the result of so much hard work. The ACSA standards are incredibly comprehensive, and it's gratifying to have the work of our staff recognised as being deserving of this accreditation".

Annual pumpkin carving on Seddon Suite







New procedure for suspected lung cancer patients

Whiston Hospital is the first in Merseyside to offer patients with suspected lung cancers a new diagnostic procedure called navigational bronchoscopy with radial probe. It is performed using the latest, advanced technology which helps clinicians to reach much deeper into the lungs to take vital tissue samples from lung abnormalities (nodules) to see if they are benign (non-cancerous) or malignant (cancerous). The tissue obtained during this procedure can be used for diagnosis and staging of cancer disease all in one procedure.



Dr Joanne Heaton, Respiratory Consultant, said: "Early diagnosis plays a crucial role in combating lung cancer, which claims the lives of 35,000 individuals every year in the UK. We are delighted to be able to offer this procedure now. There are a host of benefits for our patients who previously would have been referred to hospitals outside of the area for similar investigations."

Lung Cancer Awareness Month

November was National Lung Cancer Awareness Month which aims to encourage people displaying the common symptoms of lung cancer, such as a persistent cough, breathlessness, or unexplained weight loss, to visit their GP. The campaign also encourages people to stop smoking which is one of the biggest causes of lung cancer and lung disease.

The Lung Cancer Nursing Team, alongside colleagues from the Tobacco Dependence Treatment Service, Macmillan Cancer Support and Roy Castle Lung Cancer Foundation, started the month with a joint awareness stand in the main entrance at Whiston Hospital.

The teams spoke with patients and staff about the importance of lung health and regular checks for detecting serious illnesses. The Roy Castle charity brought the topic to life with giant inflatable lungs to illustrate visually how our lungs can be damaged by disease and affected by our lifestyles.





Diwali celebrations

Colleagues came together at Nightingale House to mark the start of Diwali, the festival of lights and one of the most important events in the Hindu calendar.




