- A vasectomy is regarded as an irreversible day case surgical procedure for men who do not wish to have more children and have completed their family. It will not protect you against sexually transmitted infections.
- It involves the bilateral removal of a small section of vas (sperm tube) and interposition of tissue between the divided and tied ends to prevent re-joining. It is usually performed under local anaesthetic but in exceptional circumstances a general anaesthetic may be necessary.
- It is unsafe to drive immediately after this procedure as it is common to experience some discomfort after the local anaesthetic wears off. There may also be some scrotal swelling and bruising with a small risk of bleeding and infection. You are advised to take the following day off work and sit quietly at home. You may resume normal activities such as work, exercise and sexual intimacy when you feel comfortable and able to do so. Up to 10% of patients may experience chronic testicular pain which may be severe in 1-2% of patients. Your skin sutures will dissolve within a few weeks and do not require removal.
- If you develop a high temperature, increased redness, throbbing or wound discharge, please contact your GP.
- You are not sterile immediately after your procedure and will need to continue using your usual contraceptive precautions until you are able to provide a semen sample at 16 weeks which show no motile sperms. Specific instructions on how to do this will be provided before your discharge from hospital. Failure of the procedure is possible but rare.
- If you experience any problems related to your operation following discharge home please contact the nurse in charge on Sanderson ward at St Helens hospital for advice via the number provided below.
