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Why do I need a Temporal Artery Biopsy and what are the benefits?

It is important to be able to confirm the diagnosis of Giant Cell Arteritis, and the best way to do this is a biopsy of the temporal artery.

Temporal arteritis (giant cell arteritis) is where the arteries, particularly those at the side of the head (the temples) become inflamed.

If the biopsy does not show any evidence of GCA, and the Doctor is satisfied that you do not have GCA, it may be possible to stop the steroid treatment (if applicable).

What is a Temporal Artery Biopsy?

A Temporal Artery Biopsy involves the surgical removal of a small piece of the temporal artery from the temple region. This is then sent to a pathologist to examine under a microscope. Temporal Artery Biopsy is not a treatment in itself.

- For a short time, there may be a small amount of pain after the anaesthetic wears off. Taking painkillers like paracetamol can help ease this pain. Always follow the instructions on the packet.
- Keep area dry for 3 4 days, unless advised differently.
- Any bleeding from the area, apply pressure with clean gauze for 10 minutes. If this does not stop or becomes excessive please seek medical advice.
- Avoid strenuous activity for a few weeks.
- Avoid putting your head in a drooped position to help reduce the risk of swelling and bleeding.
- The wound is about 3-4 cm long and usually absorbable sutures (stitches) are used. If you have stitches that need to be removed, these will be done at your follow up appointment. Otherwise the sutures will dissolve over the next few weeks.
- Post-operative infection which may appear as redness which progressively increases in size or a continuous wound discharge. If you have any concerns about this please contact the eye clinic or attend your nearest walk in/Urgent Care Centre.
- If you have been given ointment to use, please apply as instructed, please always wash your hands before treating your eyes.

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
