



Are we satisfied?

The results from a national survey of NHS staff show that the Trust is performing better than the national average in a number of important areas of staff satisfaction. This helps staff to deliver the best possible care to our No.1 priority: our patient. The key positives from the report are outlined in the boxes below:

Support from managers

More staff at the Trust agreed that:

- Managers could be counted on to help with difficult work
- Managers gave clear feedback on their work
- Managers help find good work/life balance
- Staff could talk to their manager about flexible working

Staff training

In the last 12 months, staff at the Trust had received above the national average training in:

- Equality and diversity
- Health and Safety
- Major incident
- Infection control

Respected and valued

Staff scored the Trust higher than the national average in areas relating to feeling respected and valued by colleagues and employers.

Staff more often:

- agreed that colleagues treated them with respect
- left their appraisal or review feeling that their work was valued by the Trust
- felt they knew how their role contributed to the Trust's overall objectives
- would recommend the Trust as a place to work

Incidents and errors

The Trust scored above the national average in reporting incidents and errors, whilst the actual occurrence of incidents and errors in the Trust was below that of the national figure.

Moves to improve by the Trust

In response to the report's findings the Trust will implement the following recommendations:

- To further improve the coverage of appraisals and personal development plans (PDPs).
- To maintain and increase the level of Health & Safety and Infection Control training.
- To give staff more feedback, to communicate the Trust's strategic vision and policies and make staff feel more valued in what they do.
- To enhance internal communications so that key messages are conveyed both downwards and upwards.
- To prioritise stress at work as having a negative impact on health and happiness of staff.

The event took place in the Spice of Life Restaurant in St Helens Hospital on Wednesday 22nd April between 6.30pm and 8.30pm. There were presentations on breast awareness and breast screening from Leena Chagla, Consultant Surgeon and Lead Clinician for Breast Services.

Also at the event were former patients such as Carole Lindberg to share their experiences. Carole, 64 from Widnes was diagnosed with breast cancer following a random screening. She was treated at the Burney Breast Unit and also underwent reconstructive surgery at Whiston. Carole says:

"If I hadn't gone to that random screening, I wouldn't have had a clue I had cancer. There was no lump to feel and it was only picked up when I had the mammogram.'

'For all women out there, no matter what age you are – be breast aware. Don't be frightened, don't put it off. Don't think that something else you are doing is more important, you might not get the chance to do those other things.

'The Unit here is absolutely phenomenal. The level of care and thoroughness with which they approach the persons' needs is fantastic. I was treated with the utmost respect, courtesy and consideration. I was treated like a Queen. I couldn't speak highly enough of the staff here."

Trust First in G.U.M. Care

The Trust is the first on Merseyside to introduce new rapid HIV testing for patients.

Patients will be tested and their results will be available within just 30 minutes. By introducing the rapid HIV test, we are helping to protect people from the spread of HIV as well as reducing waiting times and anxiety for our patients and making sure they get the most appropriate care, support and treatment as quickly as possible.

Patients are seen by a health expert at St Helens Hospital's Genito-urinary Medicine (GUM) clinic. Following a discussion about the test, patients give a simple mouth swap or finger prick blood sample. This sample is tested and then 30 minutes later the results show up positive or negative.

After the sample is tested, the specialist team will discuss the result with the patient and offer the appropriate support, from counselling to advice on health promotion and follow-up treatment.

Every single one of our patients who come for planned surgery is now screened for MRSA. If the infection is found, patients will be given a course of antiseptic body wash and ointment to use before further screenings.

The screening programme is just one of a range of measures used by the Trust to keep patients safe and will help maintain our high standards that resulted in maximum scores in the Healthcare Commission's Hygiene Code in 2008.

Anthea Quine from Runcorn was a patient at Whiston Hospital. She said: "I was perfectly happy to have the swab taken and I think it is important to have it done. It didn't hurt and wasn't even uncomfortable, so there's nothing to worry about."




