The National Peer Review Team recently assessed cancer services at the Trust and preliminary reports are extremely positive.

The team reviewed the Specialist Skin Service, Gynaecology and Urology teams and were very impressed with the work being carried out and the proactive work of the teams in providing patients with excellent care.

The team were especially pleased with the newly developed Regional Specialist Skin Service which combines the Trust's expertise in dermatology, cancer care, radiology and plastic surgery. This team meet regularly to review skin cancer cases at the Trust and also provides treatment for complex cases referred to the Trust by doctors from across Merseyside.

Ann Marr, Chief Executive said: "I would like to thank all members of the teams for achieving this positive review and for their continued efforts to keep the Trust at the forefront of providing cancer patients with excellent care."

Another Clean bill of bealth!

The Trust has again achieved all the requirements of an independent inspection into the prevention and control of infections.

The Trust was visited in January 2010 as part of an annual series of unannounced visits to hospitals throughout the country by the Care Quality Commission (CQC).

The inspectors visited the surgical assessment unit, the acute medical unit and ward H5 - stroke unit and found that the Trust met all the criteria.

Ann Marr, Chief Executive said: "I am delighted that we have met all of the requirements of the hygiene inspection again. Maintaining our excellent record in these inspections is a tribute to the hard work of our staff and illustrates our commitment to providing patients with an environment that is clean and safe."

- Providing adequate hand washing facilities and antibacterial hand rub
- Decontaminating instruments and equipment effectively
- Providing patients and the public with information on how the Trust is preventing and controlling infections
- Carrying out regular audits to ensure that policies are being followed

Staff working in the Orthopaedic Unit need to work across all areas to gain the necessary skills.

The Trust has a close partnership with Medirest and will work with them to ensure that these patients have a wider choice of meals with picture menus made available.

Sherdley Medical Centre

GP surgery opening times:

The centre welcomes 3 new GPs to St Helens and includes 2 treatment rooms and 7 consulting rooms. The centre is managed by Aspect Health, a consortium of 4 local practices and provides a one stop shop for healthcare at St Helens Hospital.

Elder Care - Home Surgery Service

Providing services at home:

- Monday to Friday 8am 8pm
- Saturday 8am 12pm

This is an innovative practice where doctors and nurses provide care to elderly housebound patients in their own homes. This scheme has been running since April 2009 and the practice at the hospital will provide an administrative base.

The new centre was opened on 28th January 2010 by The Mayor of St Helens, Cllr Terry Shields.

New Dialysis Unit Welcomes First Patients

The newly built 12-bed unit is one of a number of new facilities opening across Cheshire and Merseyside as part of the government's independent sector procurement scheme.

The new unit, which will be formally opened on 8th March, is part of a wider

kidney care strategy aimed at increasing dialysis services and ensuring that patients with kidney problems have access to treatment as close to their homes as possible.

The unit is hosted by the Trust but is managed by independent sector company; Fresenius Medical Care Renal Services. Patients will be under the care of Consultant Nephrologists from the Royal Liverpool & Broadgreen University Hospitals NHS Trust.

Magnet arrives for new Whiston MRI scanner

The magnet for the new MRI scanner has been brought into the new Whiston Hospital as the building is being prepared for its grand opening.

The MRI scanner is one of the first of its type in this country and will be one of the hospitals most expensive new items of medical equipment. A huge crane was used to lift the six and a half tonne magnet (the weight of an Indian Elephant) into the building. Vinci construction

staff used an electric transporter to guide the magnet through the new hospital

corridors and into the new Radiology Department.

David Anwyl, Assistant Director of Operations for Clinical Support Services said, "This state of the art MRI scanner will produce highly detailed images to further improve the quality of patient care."

Whiston Hospital's Major Incident Exercise

The Trust is planning an emergency exercise at the new Whiston Hospital to test plans for a major incident.

The exercise, named 'Dark Matter', will take place on Saturday 13th March and will involve nominated staff from the Trust along with colleagues in the emergency services, local authorities and voluntary agencies.

Exercise *Dark Matter* will enable agencies to practice their coordinated emergency response and test the Accident and Emergency team within the new Whiston Hospital. The exercise will also test lines of communication between those in charge of the emergency response and give staff practical experience of running a reception centre for family and friends of the casualties.

Jayne Heaney, Head of Emergency Planning said: "As a key organisation in response to a major emergency, the Trust is obliged to undertake a mock exercise every 3 years. Exercise *Dark Matter* will give us a one off opportunity to practice in an empty, Accident and Emergency Department so that we are fully prepared and have robust plans in the event of an actual major incident."



Introducing the Carers Support Team

The Carers Support team provide advice, support and information on a wide range of services for carers, including getting help with claiming benefits. This is an invaluable service for carers and staff at the Trust can refer people who are in need of assistance.

The service is a partnership between the Trust and its Halton and St Helens based partners in the Primary Care Trust, the local councils and the Princess Royal Trust for Carer's Centres.

Patient Data - PROTECTE

Maintaining patient confidentiality is paramount to the Trust's commitment to the privacy and dignity of patients. In support of this, over 170 administration staff recently were given intensive training on the Data Protection Act (1998).

The Whiston Story



Medical House Officers and Nurses in 1913

The original Whiston Hospital was built in 1843 as a Victorian workhouse for the poor. By 1851 the workhouse accommodated 124 people including 7 employees. The first actual hospital wards were built in 1865 accommodating 50 male and 50 female patients and included a convalescent ward and an ophthalmic ward.

In 1871 a new General Hospital was built with a medical isolation unit

added in 1887 for cases of cholera and other serious infectious diseases of the time. When the National Health Service was established in 1948, the hospital, then known as the County Hospital, had 6 main blocks of wards accommodating 500

patients.

Vard E3 in 1948

Renamed Whiston Hospital in 1953, the hospital expanded its range of

specialties. In 1960 the 82 bed Burns & Plastic Surgery Unit opened and four

years later a new Intensive Care Unit and a Pathology Laboratory were built. In 1973 these were joined by a new Maternity Unit, a Special Care Baby Unit, an Ear Nose and Throat Unit and the Postgraduate Medical Centre.

From 2010, the new Whiston Hospital will usher in a new era for both the Trust and the local community, with state of the art facilities in a new modern world class hospital.

Trust nurses advise on RCN guidelines

Two children's nurses at Whiston Hospital have contributed to new Royal College of Nursing (RCN) guidelines on breast feeding.

Kate Walker and Stacey Moore, Breast Feeding Link Nurses, were selected to provide expert views to help mothers breast feeding their children while they are being cared for on children's wards.

Kate Walker said, "We work closely with our colleagues in maternity and found that having Link Nurses who are trained in breast feeding helps the new mums whose children are cared for on this ward to breast feed their

Stacey Moore said, "We based the recommendations on our experience and were keen to get involved in this project as we are dedicated to supporting breast feeding mums."

Their recommendations included:

- New methods and equipment needed for expressing milk.
- Providing comfortable and private areas to express milk.
- Outlining the benefits of a balanced diet when breast feeding.
- Showing mothers alternative methods of feeding.
- Teaching mothers how to feed the baby breast milk through a tube.


