'Cleanest hospitals,' say Patients

St Helens and Whiston hospitals are among the cleanest in the country, according to the latest national survey of inpatients.

The Trust has achieved the highest score of all acute Trusts in the country for how patients rated the cleanliness of their room or ward. In addition the Trust scored in the top 20% nationally in 26 of the 64 areas focusing on the quality of care and the hospital environment.

Ann Marr, Chief Executive said: "We are delighted that patients rate the Trust and our services as among the best in the country. The findings of this survey further highlight the achievements of our staff to ensure that patients are provided with excellent care in an environment that is clean and safe."

Dr Susan Church, Consultant Respiratory Physician said: "We are delighted that this valuable service has been recognised with this prestigious award. Bob Prattey, Chief Executive of the Liverpool Arena presented the People's Choice Award nominated by readers of the St Helens Star newspaper.



The former Accident & Emergency Department, Critical Care Unit and Burns and Plastic Surgery Unit has been transformed!

Nightingale House has a new Education, Training and Conference Centre with a 160 seat lecture theatre along with 2 smaller lecture rooms, 4 dedicated skills labs, 2 simulation rooms, 3 IT training rooms and additional seminar rooms.

The new Library and Knowledge Service within this centre provides 24 hour access to a full range of facilities. Pathology services are now provided in state of the art laboratory facilities in the new building. These modern Pathology laboratories will help to ensure that the Trust continues to provide short waiting times for test results and excellent patient care.

Nightingale House also provides modern, purpose built office accommodation for around 20

departments, all under one roof. These bright, airy, open plan areas are airconditioned to provide staff with a comfortable working environment.

Like both Whiston and St Helens hospitals, Nightingale House has an energy efficient building management system. This innovative system regulates heating, lighting and air conditioning automatically to ensure that energy use is controlled across the building helping to save costs.

Access to Nightingale House:

Access from the hospital to Nightingale House is via the exit opposite the Pharmacy on Level 1.

The main entrance is via the first bridge link. Nightingale House is open during normal working hours but swipe card access is required at all other times.

The Education and Training Conference Centre is accessed via a second bridge link. The centre is open during normal working hours with swipe card access and a video entry system.

Sexual Health in Sichuan

Gary Barker, Senior Sexual Health Advisor in the Sexual Health Clinic in St Helens Hospital, recently visited the Chengdu Infectious Diseases Hospital in China, to help with the training and development of staff there.

"This was the only hospital caring for patients with infectious diseases in the province of Sichuan, in the South West of China, with a population of over 10 million people. The visit was arranged by Barry and Martins Trust (a charity that specialises in HIV and AIDS education, prevention and care) to provide training for doctors and nurses, in the care and management of patients with HIV and AIDS."


During his 2 week stay, Gary gave presentations on communication skills, medication and side effect management. He also provided one to one support and training to staff on the wards.

Gary said: 'HIV medication is provided free from the Chinese government, however any admissions to hospital have to be paid for, or the patient has

to have medical insurance. Whilst I was on the ward one patient with AIDS and tuberculosis was discharged as he

'HIV testing services in China are improving, especially in the gay community, but most patients are diagnosed HIV positive when their immune system is very weak and have gone on to develop AIDS. One patient I met on the ward was Denny, a 23 year old gay man who was diagnosed in November 2010, after admission to another hospital with pneumonia. Denny had a weak immune system caused by HIV and also had pneumonia and tuberculosis. This made management of his condition complicated, which sadly was typical of the patients I met."

Gary has established links with doctors and nurses at the hospital and will continue to provide them with advice on developing their services.

Stop the Clot!

Blood clots in people aged under 40 have claimed over 1,000 deaths in the UK over the last four years according to the Office of National Statistics.

Some people coming into hospital are at increased risk of developing blood clots known as venous thromboembolism (VTE) and deep vein thrombosis (DVT). This is because they may be having an operation and they may need plenty of bed rest. Other factors can increase this risk, such as previous or family history, conditions such as cancer, heart failure, respiratory disease and some medications.

Staff at the Trust are helping to minimise these risks by following these four simple steps:

- 1. Assess every patient
- 2. Review the risk every time
- 3. Make a plan to prevent clots
- 4. Involve and empower patients

Spotlight on:

THE COUNTER FRAUD TEAM

The Counter Fraud team at the Mersey Internal Audit Agency (MIAA) work with the Trust to detect and prevent fraud in the NHS. Defrauding money from the NHS deprives hospitals and patients of valuable equipment, staff and resources and costs the taxpayer more money. Whenever the team detects fraud, they will undertake legal proceedings to recoup the money to be put back into caring for patients.

Examples from actual NHS fraud cases:

Health Professionals – treating private patients during time they are paid for NHS work without prior agreement, forging prescriptions or any document to make a claim for something they are not entitled to.

Managers and Staff – submitting fraudulent claims for expenses, claiming to be sick from work when they are undertaking paid or unpaid work.

Contractors and Suppliers – charging for higher quality or greater quantity of items than those supplied and using inappropriate tendering processes.

Patients – claiming for free or reduced cost treatment and services when they are not entitled and using false names to get prescription drugs.

Safend approved Data Sticks



Safend Approved Data Sticks

New government legislation means that public authorities can be fined up to £500,000 for serious data breaches. Four councils have recently been fined for failing to secure data properly.

NHS organisations were responsible for 30 per cent of the security breaches reported to the Information Commissioner's Office over the last two years. It is therefore vital that the Trust does all it can to secure data.

This is why the Trust has deployed a new software solution called 'Safend' to control the use of USB drives and data sticks being connected to Trust computers and laptops to help mitigate the risk of serious data breaches.

Safend is being installed on all computers and laptops and only encrypted USB data sticks requested through Health Informatics and approved USB devices may be used. For further information and to apply for an encrypted


