

#### Consultant Rheumatologist

Rikki has worked at the Trust for 19 years, initially as a senior registrar

from January 1993, before being appointed as Rheumatology Consultant since September 1995.

#### Describe your current role:

The Trust is holding the 4th National Dementia Conference on Wednesday 19th September 2012 at Aintree Racecourse.


Patients who have dementia experience many more complications and stay longer in

## **Double Excellent for PEAT**

For the 7th year running, the Trust has been named as one of the top performers in the recent Patient Environment Action Team (PEAT) assessments.

Both St Helens Hospital and Whiston Hospital scored top marks of 'Excellent' for their high standards in the categories of 'Food', 'Patient Environment' AND 'Privacy and Dignity'.

The PEAT assessments check NHS hospitals and units throughout England. The assessments are carried with the involvement of patients,

patient representatives and members of the public.

Ann Marr, Chief Executive said: "We are extremely delighted that St Helens and Whiston hospitals have continued to achieve an 'EXCELLENT' PEAT rating for the seventh year in a row. The Trust works very hard to maintain the highest standards and these latest results highlight our commitment to providing patients with a world class environment and the very best quality of care."

## Top marks for patient safety



The Trust has scored top marks in the latest NHS patient safety assessment.

Assessors for the NHS Litigation Authority (NHSLA) have awarded the Trust the highest score ever given to a hospital trust across England for the Level 2 assessment.

This year, for the first time, the NHSLA assessment involved visits to wards and departments to assess whether the Trust follows policy across its clinical practice. Assessors commented on the warm

welcome, enthusiasm and high levels of motivation in the staff they met during their visit.

Ann Marr, Chief Executive said: 'We're very pleased with the results from the NHSLA patient safety assessment with the Trust receiving the highest score that any trust has received. Patient safety is extremely important to us and we will always aim to learn and improve, ensuring that patients receive the highest standard of care."

## Diabetes Open Day

## St Helens Hospital Diabetes Centre, Monday 11th June 2012 2-4pm

The award-winning Diabetes Team at St Helens Hospital are holding an open day to raise the awareness of diabetes.

According to the charity organisation Diabetes UK, approximately 2.9 million people within the UK were diagnosed with diabetes last year with an estimated further 850,000 people having diabetes but being unaware of it. Local figures show that rates of diabetes are higher in Knowsley, Halton and St Helens than the national average.

The Trust's Open Day is being held during Diabetes Week 2012 and is for anybody who wants more information on diabetes and the treatments that are available.

Experts from the specialist diabetes team will be available to answer questions and provide information on currently available treatments, including insulin pump therapy. People with diabetes will also be available to talk about their experiences and living with diabetes.

Dr Niall Furlong, Consultant Diabetologist at the Trust said: "Diabetes has increased significantly in the local community over recent years and if left unmanaged, can lead to serious life threatening complications."

"The Open Day is a fantastic opportunity for people to come and meet the team and find out about the range of services we offer to patients. We want to see as many people as possible benefiting from the service we provide, so please come along to find out more!."

## Newlands Adventure Holiday for Children with Diabetes

Youngsters with diabetes spent the bank holiday weekend orienteering and canoeing, thanks to the Paediatric Diabetes Team at the Trust.

Each year, since 1992, the Paediatric Diabetes Team has taken young people with diabetes to the Lake District for a weekend of fun and activity. The weekend is funded by grants from the Widnes & St Helens Children's Diabetic Group who are affiliated to Diabetes UK.

The trip is often the first time the young people have been away from home or have spent time with someone who also has diabetes. This year a total of 18 young people joined the trip, 8 to 14 years old, nine of whom had never been away before.

The weekend is a mixture of education about their diabetes and physical activities. Children & staff take part in a range of activities including archery, orienteering, and mountain biking, canoeing and other challenging climbing activities.



Each year, hospital staff volunteer their time to take the youngsters away. Attending this year were, Dr Ijaz Ahmed, Consultant Paediatrician, Anne Brennan and Helen Thornton, Paediatric & Adolescent Diabetes Specialist Nurses, Kay Archer and Sarah Smith, Staff Nurse, and Jackie Love, Dietician.

Dr Ahmed, Consultant Paediatrician said: "It is so important for young people to learn about their diabetes and how to manage the condition. The Lake District trip allows the youngsters to meet and interact with people with diabetes and to learn in a fun, safe environment."

## Safeguarding is Everyone's Business

Safeguarding services are a crucial part of keeping the community safe from abuse, harm and neglect. It is the

responsibility of everyone to report any concerns that they may have in relation to the abuse, or suspected abuse, of vulnerable people.

### Why do we need to Safeguard Vulnerable Adults?

Everyone has the right to live their lives free from violence, fear, and abuse

#### Who is a Vulnerable Adult?

Anyone over the age of 18 years who is receiving or may be in need of community care services

#### What is Abuse?

Abuse is a violation of an individual human and civil rights by any other person or persons

#### What are the types of abuse?

Physical, financial or material, sexual, emotional psychological, neglect and acts of omission, institutional or discriminatory (hate crime).

#### Anyone could be an abuser

It is often someone who is known and trusted. This could include family members or partners, a neighbour, health or social worker, a volunteer worker, a friend or service user.

#### Things that may make people vulnerable

Some adults are more at risk than others e.g. those with a physical or learning disability, sight or hearing loss, those suffering from a severe illness or mental health problems.

People with dementia or simply those who depend on others to care for them

#### Abuse can happen in many different places

Someone's own home, a care home, hospital, day centre or public place

#### What do you need to do?

Four "Rs"

Recognise - Respond - Report - Record

### Improving End of Life Care in the Acute Setting

"It is now time for acute hospitals to embrace a positive culture in end of life care and recognise that it is a core responsibility of every hospital and health care professional to deliver excellence for people at the end of life and their families"

The Department of Health's End of Life Care Strategy (2008) is a blueprint for improving the care of all dying people over ten years, regardless of diagnosis. It emphasises that improved end of life care provision in acute hospitals is crucial given that currently more than half of all deaths take place there.

In June 2011 NHS North West committed funding to end of life care (EoLC) programmes to develop network plans to address EoLC within the acute hospital.

The Trust's End of Life Care team was awarded £65,000 to support the implementation and development of a local hospital plan submitted through the Merseyside & Cheshire network for end of life care.

The main thrust of the plan focuses on three key priorities as identified from National Key Performance Indicators and End of Life Care Quality Markers:

- 1. Reduce anticipated deaths in hospital by 5%
- 2. Increase use of the Liverpool Care pathway for the dying patient to 50% for anticipated deaths
- 3. Provide a consistent End of Life Care education programme to develop an appropriately skilled keyworker in every clinical area and to develop the EoLC skills of the wider general workforce specifically:
  - Communication Skills
  - Holistic needs assessment
  - Symptom control, comfort and well-being
  - Advanced care planning

## **Information Prescriptions are coming!!!**

'Information Prescriptions' is a simple term used to describe the information given to patients after a consultation. They are very much centred on what is relevant to the patient's needs at that point in time.

National guidance around patient information provisions is to be implemented across the Trust and initially the Clinical Nurse Specialists in Cancer Services will be trained on Cancer Information Prescriptions. This service is housed on NHS Choices website and contains information about cancer, its treatments and effects on lifestyle.

#### Why are they needed?

The National Patients Survey identified that only 66% of patients recall being given written information at diagnosis. There is also evidence that not all information is reliable and of good quality. The Information Prescription System aims to address inequalities and discrepancies, allowing patients and health care professionals to access good quality nationally recognised information at relevant points in the patients' journey. This will ensure patients are well informed and empowered with their decision making with regards to diagnosis and treatment.

#### When will the Trust start to use them?

The implementation of Information Prescriptions is a two year plan, using a phased approach. The implementation plan will be delivered with involvement from many disciplines including I.T. Clinical Governance, patient communication leads, Learning & Development, members of the Multi-Disciplinary Teams, National Cancer Action Team, Macmillan Network Information Manager, and many more. This is to get the broadest view possible and aim for seamless implementation.



With loyalty will I endeavour to aid the Physician, in his work, and devote myself to the welfare of those committed to my care.

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
