

November 2016 Siobainn Bathgate Colorectal Pelvic Floor Nurse


Nominated by Dr Mike Horner, Consultant, Care of the Elderly

Lilac Centre marks Silver **Anniversary**



The Lilac Centre for Cancer Care has marked 25 years of providing exceptional care to oncology and haematology patients in the region.

On Tuesday 14th February, staff, patients and special guests gathered to celebrate this momentous occasion and for one member of staff it was a double celebration. Sue O'Hanlon, chemotherapy nurse, returned to work at the centre 25 years to the day after she helped to open it!

Sue said, "When I received the start date for my new job I couldn't believe what a coincidence it was. I feel like I'm returning to my spiritual home and I can't wait to get started again."

The event was opened by Toby Nicholson, Clinical Director and speakers included John Tappin, Consultant Haematologist, Ernie Marshall, Consultant in Medical Oncology and Ann Marr, Chief Executive, who talked about how proud she was of the staff who have made the Lilac Centre such a warm and welcoming place for patients and their families.

Lilac Centre fact file

- The Lilac Centre was established in 1992
- In 1992, the centre treated between 25-30 patients a week. Today, that number is over 250
- The centre moved from Whiston Hospital to St Helens Hospital in 2008
- Both haematology and oncology patients receive treatment at the centre
- Ambulatory chemotherapy has increased approximately 30% year on year since 2014
- The centre also offers holistic and complimentary care including; counselling services, reiki, aromatherapy, reflexology and hot stone therapy




The campaign reached almost 200,000 people in just 24 hours and the films shared throughout the day were viewed over 46,000 times.

Smoke Free

STHK is a smoke free site

Please DO NOT smoke on Trust premises

We are smoke free

All sites across the Trust became smoke free on 1st April 2017. This includes Whiston Hospital, St Helens Hospital and Alexandra Park.

Staff are not be permitted to smoke on any Trust premises, in any area, in a bid to establish a smoke free environment for everyone. This policy applies to all Trust employees and volunteers including contractors who work within the Trust.

So what does this mean for you...

- Staff are not allowed to smoke anywhere on Trust premises
- Staff are not allowed to smoke in vehicles parked on Trust premises
- Staff who smoke near to Trust premises must not do so in uniform or work wear
- Uniform and / or work wear must not smell of smoke
- This also applies to e-cigarettes

Giving up smoking is hard, whether that's during working hours or permanently, and this is not underestimated by anyone here at the Trust. To help those who wish to take this opportunity and choose to quit altogether, there is a great deal of advice and information available for all staff.

Did you know that you are four times more likely to QUIT if you do so with the help of a healthcare professional than with willpower alone.

SPOTLIGHT ON

Acute Kidney Injury Team

KEY FACTS

- Acute Kidney Injury or AKI is a sudden fall in kidney function as measured by blood tests and urine output, AKI is identified in the same way. Although named 'Acute Kidney Injury' it is only very rare that the kidneys have been physically injured
- 1 in 5 of all emergency admissions into hospital are associated with an Acute Kidney Injury (AKI) with around 20% to 30% of AKI cases being preventable
- AKI is a rapid onset condition which can either recover or leads to chronic kidney disease
- Around 100,000 deaths in secondary care are associated with AKI, with AKI being 100 times more deadly than an MRSA infection
- Costs to NHS from AKI were initially estimated at £434-620m per year, but these have recently been revised to over £1bn

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS & OUTCOMES

Despite being a relatively new team, the AKI Team has demonstrated a number of successful achievements:

- STHK was the only participating Trust to achieve the Appropriate Care Score target set by the Advancing Quality Initiative
- An average of a 2.2 day reduction in length of stay for all patients with AKI
- A reduction in readmissions after a diagnosis of AKI on the previous admission
- A reduction in utilisation of critical care for AKI
- Awarded for the best overall abstract at a joint Greater Manchester & Eastern Cheshire

KEY PROJECTS

The team have transformed the management of Acute Kidney Injury in the Trust with a number of tools and innovations introduced to enhance patient care and experience, with a huge number of projects planned in the near future. The team have introduced:

- An electronic AKI lab alert
- AKI management bundle and toolkit
- An electronic discharge template
- Co-developed an AKI APP with Cheshire & Mersey AKI Network
- Co-developed regional sick day guidance for AKI with Pan Mersey Area Prescribing Committee
- · Patient information material
- A Pharmacist alerting dashboard
- An IV Fluid Policy
- IV Fluid updated charts
- Hydration assessment tools
- Trust-wide educational sessions

They have also collaborated with North West Coast Innovation Agency on an eLearning package for care home staff regarding hydration and have contributed to national and international research.



WORLD KIDNEY DAY

The team held an event at Whiston Hospital to mark World Kidney Day 2017, with a theme of 'Hydration and your kidneys'. They answered queries from both patients and staff regarding AKI and

explained how best to keep hydrated. The day was a huge success with a great deal of interest from everyone.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS & PROJECTS

The team is currently developing hydration assessment tools for implementation Trust-wide. Electronic fluid balance charting also commenced piloting on wards 4C and 3D in March with Trust-wide roll out to follow.

John's Campaign goes from strength to strength

Following the overwhelming success of John's Campaign in the Department of Medicine for Older People, we are delighted to announce that the campaign will now be rolled-out across the Trust.



John's Campaign is a national campaign which calls for the right of people living with dementia to be supported by their carers whilst in hospital.

A special launch event was held at Whiston Hospital with guest speakers including Ann Marr, Chief Executive, Nicci Gerrard, John's Campaign National Lead and carers who have been helped by the Trust.

As a group, people with dementia often fail to thrive in hospital. A recent report by the

Alzheimer's Society confirms they stay longer in hospital, are less safe and experience worse outcomes than their peers without this disability. Their levels of functioning declines and they are less likely to return to their own homes and more likely to be readmitted.

Above all, people with dementia need person-centred care and extra attention paid to their physical and psychological wellbeing, yet because of their cognitive and communication difficulties, this may be almost impossible for hospital staff to provide. Carers are "the

dementia patient's voice and memory" and if a carer is willing and able to continue their support through a hospital admission, then we welcome their continued input into their loved one's everyday care.

The Trust aims to work in partnership with carers to provide ongoing support. Main carers have the right to stay throughout the day or night, however, we understand that this may not be possible for all carers and should not be seen as a duty or responsibility.

Here are some of the recent projects funded at the Trust:

- 3 iPads for the Voluntary Services to assist in their interaction with patients living with dementia. The iPads will be loaded with special apps designed to aid reminiscence and communication
- 4 CD players and a collection of CDs for patients to listen to on Ward 1A, Frailty Unit
- A 'makeover' of the lounge area on Duffy Suite. This area is being increasingly used for social activities on the ward with quizzes, bingo and other events happening on an almost daily basis. These activities are an enormous benefit to patients who spend, on average, around 3 weeks on the intermediate care ward and the team would like the environment to be more active, comfortable and welcoming.
- New toys for children's outpatient areas at Whiston and St Helens hospitals
- Puzzle books, adult colouring books and reminiscence colouring books were requested by a number of staff and so the charity will provide and distribute these to wards at both Whiston and St Helens hospitals
- The charity will provide a variety entertainer/magician who will visit the hospitals monthly throughout 2017 to entertain adult patients and help to alleviate the stress of a hospital stay and promote wellbeing. This will benefit patients across the Trust including, but not exclusive, to the Department of Medicine for Older people, the Lilac Centre, Duffy Suite and Seddon Suite. The entertainer can be booked via the charity office
- Wall murals for the Special Care Baby Unit featuring children who have been cared for by the team and who have grown into healthy and happy people sharing a message of positivity and hope
